One of the blogs I read regularly had a recent post entitled "the greatest blessings in life are often the most forgotten." I agreed with the author so much that I decided to riff on the same topic here.

In October, I celebrated 28 years of marriage. My husband is loving and kind and quirky. He delights in this time of year as he loves pheasant hunting – which he would happily tell you about, for hours.

I may take him for granted too much. When I hit the saturation point for talking about pheasant hunting, I may absent myself from his presence. There are days I am exasperated and forget to say "I love you."

I have two stepsons, who are terrific people and who live nearby, but because they have busy families, we don't see as much as we'd like. I love watching the six grand-kids grow and all their different personalities and activities. I am grateful for all of them, and for the technology that helps us connect even when we can't be together.

My three kids are in their twenties now. As of this writing, all three have earned master's degrees. It is a pleasure to have conversations with them. They are considerate and kind and funny and intelligent and entertaining. They are hard workers, and persistent strivers for justice. They have brought me joy since they were babies and continue to do so. I have loved every stage of their lives and look forward to all their future adventures. We have made countless lasting memories, and yet I am wistful when they are not home anymore.

Why does it seem that our greatest blessings in life are the ones we too quickly forget, or take the most for granted?

It's not that I don't appreciate them. It's just that too often, my mind dwells on other things: commitments at work, social media feeds, national news, sporting events, or someone on the phone.

The good I have been given is too easily replaced in my mind by the urgent or the things I wish I had.

My home is warm and safe—a blessing that not everybody enjoys. But you know what I think about most while at home? The dresser handle that needs to be repaired, the ceiling fan that is wobbly, or that my bedroom takes too long to cool off at night.

My home provides safe shelter for me and my family. But rather than focusing on the positives, it's easy to dwell on the problems.

My freezer has food, so does our pantry. But what do I often say while staring into the fridge? "There's nothing in here to eat."

Some have closets full of clothes, packed to the brim on every hanger and shelf—enough supply to last the next ten years if necessary. And yet, the refrain is the same, "I have nothing to wear."

Gratitude or discontent, the choice is ours.

I grew up in a loving family, and my mother is still living in her home of 55 years. Despite leaving home 40 years ago, I talk to her every week, if not more. I was given a stable and loving home upon which to build the foundation of my life—a blessing as great as any other. And yet, too often, I forget about all the sacrifices my parents made along the way to provide that for me.

I'm not sure why the greatest blessings are the easiest to forget.

Maybe it's because they've become so commonplace to us that we don't even notice their existence (until they are gone). Maybe it's the nature of the human mind to constantly explore new thoughts and adventures and ideas, rather than remaining in the stability of what's known. Maybe it's because we live in a world that constantly stirs up discontent in our hearts and lives to distract us from the good. Or maybe it's because we just get so rushed and busy, we don't slow down long enough, or often enough, to appreciate what we already have.

I'm not entirely sure of the exact reason—and maybe it's different for each person. But I do know this: We'd appreciate the goodness and stability in our lives a little bit more if we made more effort to notice the good in our world—starting with the most obvious, because the most obvious is often the greatest.

The time change makes it more likely that I will watch the sun rise. May I take it in as a blessing, and not take it for granted. Another new day!

Carrie Kids



Altar Focus

You may have read an editorial in the Bismarck Tribune that highlighted how many students in the Bismarck Public Schools are in need of warm clothing this year – a few hundred families! The BPS foundation is inviting donations of new or very lightly worn snow pants, parkas, water-resistant gloves, and snow boots especially. (hats and scarves will not be turned away) They are also asking for new water bottles, as each child must have their own, since during the pandemic the water fountains are all turned off. If it isn't practical to go shopping, donations of money earmarked for this can be brought/sent to LCC (particularly if you want credit for the donation on your church statement) or made directly on the website bpsfoundation.com. It's under the "featured initiatives" banner, and is called the Kids Kicks initiative.

The second half of our altar focus this month is the special project we all love, spear-headed by Shiela Mugaas in memory of her cousin. This is the collection of teddy bears for traumatized children. Some bears are already in the sanctuary, where we will pray over them and bless them before giving them to first responders to help in those tough moments of crisis. You are invited to bring a bear to join them! At the end of November the bears will be distributed.

Online Giving Options

We want to say a giant THANK YOU to all of you who, even through this pandemic, have given to help LCC continue its ministry to the congregation, the community, and beyond. We are not yet back to "normal" giving levels, but have managed to stay in good shape as expenses have also been down. They will go up now as more programs start up again and the building is used more frequently, so we are grateful for all your continuing gifts.

Since many are not comfortable coming back yet, we are grateful to have so many options for giving. There is a button on our website, churchofthecross.org, that makes it very simple. If you are a smart phone or device user, you can also get and use the app "Give Plus". (You just have to be careful to choose the Lutheran Church of the Cross in Bismarck, rather than a different one somewhere else!) Or, you can simply text a number to our dedicated giving line (701)969-7030. So, for instance, if you want to give \$25, you simply text 25 to that number. (If you have a Vanco account already set up through our online button or app or texting, it will work across all of these approaches.) All of your giving, through any of these ways, will also be recorded on the statements you get from the church a couple times each year.
