There is a plant that sits on my desk at LCC. Maybe you've seen it. It always looks somewhere between ok, if a little bit sad, and downright terrible. I don't know what kind of plant it is -I should probably get one of those apps that will identify it for me if I snap a picture of it.

More than once someone has told me to get rid of that plant. But, I am sentimental. I don't like to murder things for a little spot of ugly or shabbyness. Goodness, what if God's attitude toward us were like that? "I'm tired of you and your problems, that's enough life for you. Zap!"

But that's not what God is like. In spite of our ugly parts, our unlovable and uncharitable attitudes, words and deeds, God waters us with grace and forgiveness and new life so that we are revived and renewed. Given second chances. And third. And so on – thanks be to God.

Just like plants, we ourselves are not meant to last forever. The last year or so, we have felt battered and worn, grief stricken with loss, weary and suffering from the environment that has surrounded us. The good news is that God's grace and mercy have never wavered during this time – God has never forgotten to water us with love and gently revive us and bring us back to life. May we remember, when we are feeling tattered, that we are cradled in the palm of God's hand, and God will never let us go.

Blessings as we journey into Lent. See you in church!

<u>Ash Wednesday – Feb, 17, 2021</u>

Ash Wednesday is usually a solemn service of reflection and repentance, often that brings one of our largest attendances of the year. The service this year will still be those things – except this year, livestreamed so that you don't need to come in person to join in this important worship experience. The ashes that are imposed on our fore-heads are made from the dried palms we waved jubilantly on a previous Palm Sunday, mixed with some olive oil.

This year we will change that experience slightly. In person, we will impose ashes at a couple of stations, using a q-tip dipped in oil and then ashes, which will allow a bit more distance. Those imposing the ashes will be masked and gloved, and we ask that you continue to mask as well.

If you are worshipping from home, we are glad to send you the service bulletin and a very small Ziploc with some ashes to use yourself. They will be available by Feb. 12, and may be picked up, but are certainly small enough for us to mail. Please let us know that you would like them, and how best to get them to you. You may want to try the q-tip application method at home as well, as the ashes can be difficult to clean off your hands. Just dip it in oil first, as using water can cause irritation. (ash + water = lye!) You can also mark the cross of ashes on the back of your hand instead of on your forehead.

Wednesday Worship in Lent

Unfortunately, we are not able to do Lenten dinners this year. That is a much loved fellowship time! But we are glad to be joining several other congregations in offering worship around the theme "Jesus On the Way." It's a new-fangled (that is, pandemic) turn on the "round robin," where we will have the opportunity to hear different speakers, although they will join us via video. The rest of the worship will be live. Faith is a

journey. Lent is a journey. The pandemic is a journey. Join us as we discover the many places and ways we have met and will meet Jesus on the way. Wednesdays in Lent: February 24 and March 3, 10, 17 and 24 at 6:15 pm.

"Making Jesus Known by Sharing Our Gifts" Council Meeting Minutes December 8, 2020

Call to Order by President Krisi (6:35pm)

Devotions: Pastor Lisa led in prayer that covered individual concerns during this difficult time

Approval of October and November Minutes Mark K motion/Kylie B second/APPROVED

Treasurer's Report: (Respectfully submitted by Art Wheeler)

All bills and statements as of November 30 have been paid.

All November bank statements have been reconciled and registries are correct.

- Total adjusted income for November was \$26,558.80, which was \$10,319 less than the budget goal of \$36,878. Remember that the October income was much higher due to a significant Charitable Contribution received that month.
- The adjusted November expenses were \$26,611.57. We had a net loss of \$52.77. The expenses were adjusted to compensate for the Replacement Media expenses. These expenses were previously reimbursed thru other gifts and designated contributions. I expect December special contributions to bring the Media Replacement line to equal.
- I have also included in the report a full Budget vs Actual review for the first 11 months of 2020 (pg 7-9). Expenses are all in a normal range being about \$9,800 less than projected budget for the first 11 months. That's good considering the lesser total income.
- The contribution to the Western North Dakota Synod for November will be \$1,168. We will have contributed \$18,734 this year towards the annual goal of \$25,000. There are four business days after the last Sunday in December. I hope to make the WND December contribution before the end of the year.
- Of particular note on the Balance Sheet, under Liabilities, is a line Promissory Note Liability 1 for \$20k. With the redemption of Promissory Notes on December 1, that line on the Balance Sheet will be eliminated. This is a great milestone for LCC and a huge thank you to our members. Actual Long Term Liabilities will total \$255,000.

A note to a reimbursement to Art Wheeler was for software updates.

Gospel Seeds - February 2021 A message from Bishop Craig

"Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven." (Matthew 6:1)

Sisters and brothers in Christ,

Grace and peace to you in the name of our Savior Jesus!

For many of us, the beginning of the sixth chapter in the gospel according to Saint Matthew marks the beginning of a sacred and holy journey through the season of Lent. I must confess, whenever I hear the words "practicing your piety before others" each Ash Wednesday, I giggle a little. Lutherans are not known for our boisterous faith sharing with others.

The Greek word in this verse of scripture speaks of "righteousness" not "piety" in a lit-eral understanding of the word. And, here's the important part, the warning in this verse speaks of the misuse of our own righteousness, how great we are or think we are. Matthew, and the season of Lent, gives us a chance to look deeply into that truth again. Are my actions and behaviors centered on me? Or on God? Lent reorients our life on God.

And when we speak and live out our faith with God's righteousness at the forefront, we, as Lutheran Christians, have something to say. I pray that we are bold enough to say it and not keep it to ourself. As my colleague, Bishop Paul Egensteiner of the Met-ro New York synod, recently said, "God is calling us to follow the example of Jesus, to live the truth and power of the Gospel, to love all people, and to continue to serve God's children together." In other words, to show others just how awesome and great God is and to worry less about showing others how great we are. May that be central to our Lenten journey this year!

A couple updates from across the synod –

- I continue to welcome invitations to be with your congregation via Zoom, video, or in-person. I've thoroughly enjoyed getting to know you and celebrate the many ways we share in the ministry God's righteousness is on display across our synod.
- The recent announcement of the closing of Lutheran Social Services of North Dakota was shocking to many across the prairie. We continue to hold all impacted in prayer – most especially the programs, staff, and clients of LSSND. May they be cared for and find hope and renewal in the days ahead.
- The synod offices will also be in a transition very soon. For many years, the synod
 offices have been in LSSND's Bismarck program center. We are currently looking
 for a new location for the synod offices. If you have an idea, please reach out to
 us!
- Synod Council will be meeting in-person or via Zoom on February 19-20. Please hold them in your prayer!
- Thank you for your Mission Support in 2020! Yes, Mission Support was below expectations. BUT – God's righteousness continued to shine through our collective

As we continue to navigate all that the world has presented to the church and world in the past year, we give God thanks and praise. It has been a challenging time to be the church in these days. God is with us. And God's righteousness will continue to shine through the church into a world longing to see the reflection of God's goodness being lived out through each one of us.
