So we are ambassadors for Christ... 2 Corinthians 5:20

I recently read a pastoral letter from Bishop Regina Hassanally to her synod, the folks of the Southeastern Synod of MN. She spoke, more eloquently than I could, about the forces we are all facing. So I have changed little of what she said in the letter that follows.

How we understand who we are shapes how we live.

Martin Luther supposedly said, "When you wash your face, remember your baptism." Remembering our baptism is remembering our identity. I'm a child of God. That is who I am. That's who you are.

The apostle Paul reminds us in 2 Corinthians that, as God's people, we are "ambassadors of Christ." As the People of God, we are beloved children of God, and we also represent more than just ourselves. Indeed, we represent what it means to be a child of God. We are, as Paul teaches us elsewhere, the body of Christ in the world today.

From Bishop Hassanally: "Dear church, this pandemic has lasted (and seemingly will continue to) longer than any of us ever imagined. I think it is fair at this point to say we are all plumb worn out. We are tired, and we are weary, and we are wondering how much longer we need to continue thinking so much about the health and welfare of others.

To this, I offer a pastoral word: remember who you are. You are the People of Got. You are followers of the way and life of Jesus. You are ambassadors of Christ.

The sheer amount of decision making this pandemic requires is exhausting. The toll that takes is wearing on us, and it is showing up all over the place: in conversations about masks and vaccines and personal freedoms, and in areas that seem completely disconnected from the pandemic but are overflows of our weariness nonetheless.

Dear church, even in your profound exhaustion, remember who you are and live and act from that place.

First, stop and remember who you are. Meditate on it. Remember your baptism: the promises you received and the promises made. Remember what it means to be a follower of Jesus: someone who loves God and loves neighbor.

Everything in our Christian life hangs on these two teachings. Our identity comes not from the animosity and anxiety that so freely swirl around us but from Jesus Christ.

So, having been re-rooted in your true identity, allow it to shape the way you live. Remember, you are ambassadors of Christ. Allow that understanding to inform how you interact and dialogue with others, how you receive decisions made by leaders, how you continue to live in community.

It has been a long pandemic road; the stress and anxiety around us only seem to increase. But those outside forces are not what shape how we live because they do not change who we are."

These restrictions will be lifted, hopefully soon. As my grandmother would say, "this too shall pass." It will have changed many things, but it hasn't changed us. Beloved family of LCC, we are the People of God, followers of Jesus, ambassadors of Christ. Let's remember who we are, every chance we get.

Israel Trip

As you may have heard, Pastor Lisa is leading a trip to Israel January 31- February 8, 2022, with an optional extension to Jordan for three extra days. Some questions have been popping up: is the trip still going? The answer is, as of this point, yes. The final call will be made in November, if there should be any situation that makes it unsafe to go. If that happens, your deposit can go to a later trip or be refunded. We are working (through Judy's Leisure Tours, a travel agency in Fargo) directly with people on the ground in Israel, including (according to Mavis Pommerer, a longtime leader of international travel groups) one of the best guides she's ever experienced. The second question we are hearing is: can I still go if I haven't yet registered? The answer to that one is also yes, with the caveat that you should register as soon as possible, as getting seats on the airplanes will get tougher and more expensive. Registration forms and information are available on tables in the narthex or from Pastor Lisa. The third question is what if I need to fly from somewhere other than Bismarck? This is certainly possible. We already have group members (mostly LCC members and their friends/family, with a few extra from Fargo, but you may invite others to join us!) flying from Fargo, Arizona and the East Coast. Please speak to Pastor Lisa if you have questions. We would love to have you join us on this trip of a lifetime. You will be amazed at how the Scriptures read in worship come alive.

Bible Studies

We currently have three Bible/book studies, and you are welcome to join in!

The Wired Word study is a weekly conversation that combines Bible study with current events. Each Thursday, a study about something in the news, with questions and suggested Bible passages to contemplate, comes to us online. We meet Fridays at 1:30 pm in the library (or elsewhere if the group is larger) for conversation. Call the office to be added to the list to receive the study anytime, and feel free to come Fridays even if you haven't read it – we will have copies, and the conversation is always interesting!

The Gather Women's Bible Study meets monthly on the first Tuesday of the month at 1:15pm in the multipurpose room. We look together at the Bible Study in the monthly Lutheran women's magazine, *Gather.* You are welcome to join us! We will meet October 5th at 1:15!

The Early Morning (also known the Mary Magdalene, because she got up early) Bible Study has reformed its ways and now meets at the more civilized hour of 9 am on the 4th Wednesday of the month. Technically a book study, we will begin reading together the book "A Praying Life" by Paul E Miller at our September 22 gathering and continue on each month. All are welcome!



A Message from Bishop Craig

"Anything can happen." (Mark 9:23b) It's certainly

been a long few months of anything and seemingly everything happening! We've all lived it and continue to live it!



Let's be honest.... These past months have been a mix feelings and a mess of emotions. As we gathered with the Rostered Ministers of our Synod for retreat and learning in Medora a few weeks ago, our time of rest and renewal was centered on a guiding Scripture from Mark 9:14-29 (Message). This gathering – the people and the focus – was exactly what I needed. What many in attendance needed. Perhaps what many of you may need?

Rev. Lisa Lewton (St. John, Dickinson) captured our time and the message in a recent eloquent blog entitled, "When One Feeling Isn't Enough". She consented to sharing it with you. Thank you, Pastor.

Last week, I spent a few days with my colleagues in Western North Dakota at an annual theological retreat. We both retreated by resting and catching up, and engaged in theological learning and discussion. It's no secret that Western North Dakota is not the most desirable location in the country to do ministry! Lutherans leaders often prefer to land in a metro area, and so what leaders in other areas might miss is a tight-knit collegial community. It is tight-knit because we know we need each other to survive! There is no sense of competition among churches, but instead a culture of support.

And so when the conversation at our retreat centered around processing the past year and looking ahead at the work yet to do, there was a flood of feelings. There was grief and hope, disappointment and gratitude, mercy and frustration, all at once.

Did you know you can feel at least two feelings at once? You do it all the time. You feel love for your spouse and also utter shock that the two of you are still married. You feel gratitude for your child and ongoing irritation that said child continues to leave a trail of messiness throughout the house. You feel content in your life at the same time you feel curious that there might be something more.

There are so many feelings in the world right now! It might be helpful to remember your neighbor may be as confused about her feelings as you are about yours. I live in one of the Covid-sickest parts of the country, so while I'm grateful people have started reconnecting at the church I serve, I feel deep concern for people's health. Should we be gathering? I think, yes. Should we be cautious? Also yes. Is it good for our souls to gather in the same space? Absolutely yes. Even now? I think, yes.

Argh. It's no small task to be human these days, with so many feelings bubbling inside of us. I encourage you today to take note of your feelings.
