

From Pastor Lisa

I recently did a one-day retreat on bread baking, led by my clergy colleague Travis Gerjets, who now runs the wonderful bakery Prairie Sky Breads in Minot. I've always been intrigued by bread baking, but all the steps, and all the time involved, made me turn to my trusty (and easy) Panasonic bread machine instead. (Still no preservatives, and you can control what goes into it – good things, right?) But I felt like the romance of "real" bread making – the discipline and physicality of kneading it and waiting for it to rise – eluded me.

It was the "retreat" part of the day that surprised me with learnings, even more than the new skills. Surprised, because it was life, not just bread, we were invited to contemplate. I want to share a few insights and questions I've been pondering since that day.

Mise en Place - "Putting in Place" or "Gathering Together" Bread:

When preparing to make bread – or to do almost anything – it is helpful to:

- -Set intentions. Why am I doing this? What results do I hope for?
- -Consider tools. Do I have the right tools for the project?
- -Consider time. Do I have enough time for the project?

-Consider space. Do I have the space – physical or emotional! – for the project? -Have a plan. Have I mapped out where I am, where I am going, and how I will get there?

<u>Retreat Question:</u> Is there a project or a relationship that you are struggling with right now which might be suffering from a lack of planning, resources or perspective? Is there anything you can do to change the situation – perhaps by re-planning, adding resources, or changing perspective?

Mixing – The Birth of Bread

When mixing, we actively or passively participate in:

-Ingredients coming together. This can be gentle or violent. Things move around.

-Gluten being created. Pressure and movement creates strength – or weakness.

-Making minor adjustments. Know your dough and what it needs.,

When we are mixing, we need to be engaged in the process that is unfolding before us.

Do your ingredients require special care? Are you trying to make something in life but are missing an ingredient? How will you handle this?

First Rise

This is where the magic happens! The dough is growing, changing, developing and becoming. It is amazing to watch.

In your life so far, how have you grown? Changed? Developed? Who is the person you have become compared to the person you were some years ago?

Shaping:

The dough is now reading to be divided and each loaf or piece becomes its very own entity.

How do you live with "unfixable lumps" in your life? in your work? Are these lumps lovable – wonky idiosyncrasies that show the humanness (*realness*) of the situation – and that you can enjoy? Or are they problems that need a different solution? How do you discern the difference?

Different bread shapes don't just magically happen – they are the unique result of combining specific ingredients, mixing techniques, and rise times. Trying to coax a baquette shape out of 100% rye mix is a bit like trying to put a square peg into a round hole. It is tough going.

Where in your life are you asking someone or something to be something they are not? Are you asking yourself to be something you are not?

Scoring:

Carefully cutting your bread (scoring) helps to give a unique shape and character to your loaf, and keeps the dough from blowing out the loaf in ways you don't want it to.

What scars do you carry that have helped define you, have made you the person you are? And, are you still open to being cut, shaped or re-shaped in order to open up to new potential?

<u>Baking:</u> An important part of being a good baker is knowing when the bread "has had enough" – whether that is in regards to mixing, rising, baking or cooling. When have you had enough? What are the signs? And are you paying attention to those signs?

This is only a partial list of what I learned, but it offered me much to ponder. I offer it to you in the same spirit of learning. Happy contemplating, and blessings on your own journey. See you in church! Pastor Lisa

A Message from Bishop Craig February 2022

A MESSAGE FROM THE OFFICE OF THE BISHOP This Month's Writer: Murray Sagsveen, Synod Attorney



We are entering a new year, and many of us have adopted resolutions or goals for the following twelve months. Let me suggest a few governance-related resolutions/goals for the congregation councils of all synod congregations during 2022:

1. Is the congregation's membership list current? The Model Constitution for Congregations states that the "Congregation Council shall provide for an annual review of the membership roster" (C12.07.) and that only voting members may vote at congregation meetings (*C8.02.c. and C10.06).

2. Has the congregation recently updated its constitution to conform with the *Model Constitution for Congregations*. If not, the congregation council or a council-appointed committee should plan to review the existing document, review likely amendments to the *Model Constitution for Congregations* by the Churchwide Assembly this August, and draft amendments for submission to the congregation's annual meeting in late 2022 or early 2023.

3. Has the congregation recently reviewed its bylaws (if any) to ensure they do not conflict with the congregation's constitution or the <u>ELCA's social statements</u>?

4. Has the congregation incorporated its bylaws (if any) into the constitution document as urged by the ELCA in the introduction to the Model Constitution for Congregations?

5. Does the congregation have an endowment fund and, if so, was it established prior to 2011? The resolution or bylaw establishing the endowment fund should be reviewed to determine if it has been updated to address state laws passed in 2011 related to qualified endowments (N.D.C.C. § 57-38-01.21) and to restricted accounts (N.D.C.C. § 10-33-21(7)).

6. When the congregation was incorporated, it filed articles of incorporation with the North Dakota Secretary of State. Many congregations were established more than a century ago, so the articles of incorporation may contain articles that conflict with state law or the congregation's constitution. The articles of incorporation should be located, reviewed, and (if necessary) updated.

7. Has the congregation council adopted key policies such as related to personnel, ethics, conflicts of interest, volunteer management, appropriate workplace environment, reporting inappropriate behavior, and supervision of minors?
