Have you ever not wanted to go to Bible Study?

Possibly you just had so much going on, and one more thing would just topple you. Maybe you felt like you hadn't prepared, and therefore you would feel embarrassed or stupid or out of place, or (God forbid) someone would notice. Perhaps your head was spinning with so many thoughts in so many directions you just wouldn't be able to concentrate.

Have you ever not wanted to go to Bible Study? (It's also fair to substitute something else that you feel you "should" do.) Have I? Well... yes, actually – even though you may think it shocking for a pastor to admit!

The thing is, I love Bible study: When I can quiet my mind and just listen. The insights I glean from others when we study together that I would never have come up with on my own. And maybe most precious of all, the growth of relationships as we share our stories and recognize the intersections of our lives with the biblical stories.

Wednesday is the beginning of the forty day season of Lent. It has always been a time for study and reflection; often a time to "give up" something in order to dedicate oneself more deeply to God.

The thing is, I don't want to burden you with one more thing you "should" do. This Lent, I invite you to *let go and let God*. Find a way to just *be* in the divine presence. That might be a walk in the fresh air to just breathe. It might be Bible study (we have several options at LCC) – which I love and know you do, too. It might be popping in to Wednesday worship at 6:15 pm as we hear how "God is still with us." (Side benefit: a lovely, not prepared-by-you, soup supper with friends all around, starting about 5 pm!) It might be being there for someone at a low point in their faith journey – or letting someone be there for you.

Most of all, this Lent, I hope you can bask in God's grace. God loves you and nothing can ever take you out of God's hand that cradles you so tenderly.

#### March Altar Focus - Sweet Deal for CAR

This project will technically continue until Easter – April 17. Once again, we will be collecting donations for our sister church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in the Central African Republic (CAR). You can pick up a tube of mini M & M's at the back of the church throughout Lent (although they are quite expensive and can't be sourced locally, so please guide your younger family members in not grabbing multiple tubes). The M & M's are, of course, delicious, and the tube makes a perfect little "bank" – it will hold \$14 in quarters, or rolled up bills or checks, or other change as well. Once you've enjoyed your treat of M & M's, please fill up the tube with your offering of choice for CAR, and drop it in the offering plate. It's so exciting to watch the tubes return!

Your gifts help fund roofs for schools and salaries for teachers, a women's center, motorbikes to help pastors and evangelists travel around the rough territory, and a clinic. All of these are immensely helpful in a country torn by war. In 2020, we as a congregation were able to send \$1000 to help CAR. Last year, it increased by 50% to \$1521.86! How much can we do this year? Watch for more information about CAR during Lent, and thank you for your generosity!

#### Wednesday Worship Lenten Series "God is still with us"

As we journey through this season of Lent together, you are invited to remember that from the foundations of the world, the Holy Spirit hovered over creation. The Spirit hovers, even now. When God's people seemed abandoned in Egypt, God guided them into the Promised Land. God guides us, even now in the midst of a pandemic when we have felt abandoned, God is still with us.

This Lent, we will explore Gospel passages that remind us that God is still with us. The good news of the gospel is that Jesus experienced the fullness of humanity—comfort and pain, celebration and heartache, and joy and suffering. And when he had the choice to escape ridicule or rejection, Jesus stuck with the outsiders, the oppressed, and the hurting. ### A Message from the office of the Bishop March 2022

This Month's Writer: Deacon Beth Anderson, Associate for Leadership & Formation



Luke 13:6-9 (NRSV) Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. 7So he said to the gardener, 'See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?' 8He replied, 'Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. 9If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down.'"

This month we begin the season of Lent. Lent is often thought of as the 40-day journey to the cross. We embark on this journey with an eye toward the future, to the resolution of Christ's victory over death and the promise of resurrection for us all.

As Christians and as humans, we spend much of our time either looking backwards at the past or looking forward toward the future. Consider our most holy days for instance. We look back at the manger with nostalgia, often romanticizing the beauty and majesty of Jesus' birth and we and look forward to the cross & resurrection with trepidation and anticipatory hope. But in so emphasizing the bookends of Jesus' life on earth, we may forget that Jesus's ministry was not defined by these two moments alone. God's love for humanity was revealed not only in manger and tomb, but also in the millions of seconds in between. In his daily interactions, Jesus paused, took time to notice and responded to what he saw - by healing a stranger, by listening to one whom society disregarded, by calling someone to service, or by teaching a way of life that defied tradition but honored the dignity of all God's children. Through these daily interactions, Jesus' attentiveness and response reveals God's love in truly life-altering ways.

The parable at the start of this newsletter comes from our gospel reading for the 3rd week in Lent this year. I like it because it causes me to pause and wonder, "What did the gardener see in fig tree that the owner did not?" Looking to the past, the owner saw no fruit. Looking to the future, he saw only a waste of good soil. But the gardener noticed something else present. What evidence was emerging that caused him to intervene?

This Lenten season, I invite you to take the posture of the gardener. How might you give attention to what Jesus is up to in your life and in your congregation right now along your journey? What signs of growth may be emerging that if examined more carefully could lead to more abundant life? What if for this season, you focused less intently on what was or what could be, and instead paused to look more closely at what God is doing right now in this in between time. What might you discover?

In the coming months, our synod is hosting several opportunities for congregations to pause and give attention to what God may be up to in our midst. We invite you to join in any of the opportunities below as you ponder: How is God inviting us to witness to Christ's love in our community right here, right now?
