"ecclesia reformata – semper reformanda!"

Actually, I don't know much Latin. The above is a slogan from Martin Luther's day, during the Reformation in the 1500s. It means "church reformed, always reforming."

Why in the world was I thinking about this? Well, I went for a walk. It's one of my favorite things to do: to calm down, to get some sunlight and vitamin D, to stir my stumps and get my heart moving, to see some nature and to think. Spring is a great time to walk through the neighborhood, watching the grass greening and buds appearing on trees, cheering on the moisture so the creek and the pond rush and fill again. I'm lucky to live in a good part of Bismarck for this, near several walking paths.

One of them, newly free of snow, wanders up a hill nearby, through enough trees that you feel, for a brief time, that you are in the woods, right here on the prairie. And it comes out right next to the Reformation Forest! This "forest" was a project done cooperatively by several Lutheran churches in town, including LCC, organized by local pastor Nadine Lehr, to celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation in 2017. I thought I would always remember which trees were planted by our LCC "team" – I didn't, but it is great to see them thriving and to remember.

The plaque marking the spot is what reminded me of the saying above. That, and the pandemic times that we have come through. I was thinking back through the last two years, and the many changes we've gone through during that time. As it started in March 2020, and we were close to Easter – it was unimaginable that we would spend the highest celebration of the church year NOT in church! But we did it, and somehow it brought us closer together. Then, months later, we thought surely this will all be over, but it wasn't. And school, and Thanksgiving, and Christmas all were different, too.

We lost friends and family members. People got sick and some have never recovered completely. There was isolation, and anger and frustration and disagreement over best ways to deal with this new tyrant virus in our midst. But there were also phone calls, and letters, and neighbors helping and listening and caring. Now, thankfully, many things have moved toward what we knew as normal before. But we have been changed.


Pastor Lisa's letter continued...

And actually, it's always been that way. The world is constantly changing. Luther lived in plague times, too – and many other horrible things have happened through the centuries since then. I've been reading in Colossians this week. Paul is exhorting us to give everything to God: to be thankful, to be kind, to be compassionate, to be patient. Those words are helping me this week. Greetings, members and friends of Church of the Cross!

Along with the other ELCA churches in the area, we have been challenged to raise funds to help finish and furnish the chapel at the new Missouri Slope Lutheran Care Center North Campus.

From its founding in 1962, LCC has been a corporate member of Missouri Slope and has been actively involved in its ministry to the aging residents of our area. Inspired by the opportunity to enhance this ministry, two of our members have pledged a total of \$25,000 that will be used to match the first \$25,000 donated by other members of the congregation. Our goal is to raise at least \$50,000 to help Missouri Slope residents enjoy a beautiful, accessible worship space that enriches their spiritual and faith development.

Would You Give A Big Charitable Gift If It Cost You Nothing?

It's not as odd as it sounds. The biggest charitable gift most people ever make really costs them nothing. Really! You don't have to be rich to make a gift of \$10,000, \$100,000 or even \$1 million. You may be able to make a big gift like this to your church, favorite ministry or charity without spending a penny out of pocket.

How can this be, you ask?

You may not have a spare million just laying around that you don't need. But you probably do have a home, vacation property, investment or retirement savings. And yes, you may need those things to sustain you for the rest of your life. No problem. Chances are those things will still have some or even most of their value when you are done with them. Why not make a gift from what's left after you've lived a long and full life?

Gifts made from the remainder of your estate is an easy way to give a large gift without sacrificing anything. Not only that, making estate gifts can be a smart way to avoid taxes, court fees, and costly time settling your estate.

How does it work?

It can be as simple as naming the church or other charity on the deed to your property (known as a "Transfer On Death Deed"), or as beneficiary on your bank account, retirement account, or other assets. You keep it and use it for the rest of your life, and then when you are done with it, it simply transfers to the charity as the new owner.

Do you have a life insurance policy that has outlived its original purpose? You may have taken out a large policy earlier in your life to protect the needs of young children or a surviving spouse. But now that the kids have grown up and the house is paid off maybe those needs are a little less pressing. Maybe you could name your church or other charity as at least one of the beneficiaries on that policy.

What if I want to protect the asset?

You may have considered transferring an asset such as your home into someone else's name to protect it in the event of large, unforeseen expenses such as for healthcare or assisted living. That can be risky and may be subject to certain look-back rules. It may be a better strategy to give the assets away, putting them into a special "life-estate" gift that allows you to continue to use the asset or even draw an income from it for the rest of your life. It can never be taken away from you as long as you live, and the church or charity will likely get a nice big gift when you pass. In addition to that future gift, you may receive an immediate tax deduction the year you make the gift. And, you can most likely do all this without spending a single penny out of pocket.

Jesus: Everyday. Everywhere.

"And remember, I am with you always." Matthew 28:20b Brothers and sisters in Christ,

Grace and peace to you in the name of our risen Savior, Jesus the Christ!

I've lived in North Dakota my entire life. I live 2.4 miles from the home I grew up in on North Fourth Street in Bismarck. Needless to say, I've witnessed and endured many wild weather events on the prairies of our beautiful state. The Holy Week blizzard of 2022 will be forever part of my memory as an historic event. It was a Holy Week journey unlike any other!

It is my hope and prayer that by the time you read this month's Gospel Seeds, the last remnants of our spring blizzard will be gone, spring will finally have arrived, and family, farm, and livestock are safe and sound without needing to worry about, at least for a short time, the threat of mother nature's power. After all, one of the most important events in our life of faith as a synod is taking place soon – SYNOD ASSEMBLY!

The 2021 WND Synod Assembly's theme focused our attention on Jesus' commandment to "love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:39) When the 2022 Synod Assembly gathers in a few short weeks, Jesus' commandment will still be ringing in our hearts and minds. After all, loving our neighbor is only possible because Jesus is always walking with us.

"Jesus: Everyday. Everywhere." (Matthew 28:16-20) is the theme of the 2022 Western North Dakota Synod Assembly. Under this theme we will listen deeply to the ways Jesus' commissioning of the first disciples at the end of Matthew's gospel is also the commissioning for Jesus' disciples across Western North Dakota in 2022.

The Synod Assembly is the highest legislative authority of a synod. Voting members from all 163 congregations across the synod will gather for worship and prayer, decision making and education, inspiration and fellowship. Throughout the assembly, we will hear from many of our ministry partners, have opportunities for learning and conversation, elect leadership to serve our synod, dive deeply into Holy Scripture during times of Bible study, and consider resolutions and memorials that will shape future mission and ministry for our synod and this church.

This year's assembly schedule is a little different. At their October 2021 meeting, the WND Synod Council unanimously approved moving the days of Synod Assembly from Thursday–Saturday to Friday–Sunday. It is our hope that this will give those who have been unable to participate in previous Synod Assemblies due to work or other commitments a chance to be part of this important event in our synod's mission and ministry. It is also our hope, that this will give all Rostered Ministers of our synod a chance to worship together without the worry of rushing home to lead Sunday morning worship.

I will offer a video sermon recording and manuscript for local congregational worship on June 5, 2022, so that all Rostered Ministers will be able to attend and participate in the full Synod Assembly schedule.


