When I was a child, growing up in Bowman (a small town in southwestern ND), I used to love to pore over catalogs. This was in the late 1960s and early 1970s, the days when we had no big box stores, but we did have three large "wishbooks": Sears, JC Penney, and Montgomery Ward. I could look at them and ponder fashion (what a hoot it would be to look at some of those fashions now!), and most of all, look at all the lovely toys. To us, that section was a virtual neon-lit Toys R Us store full of treasures! I remember one year as Christmas neared, when we were maybe 6 and 7 years old, my mother (no doubt in an attempt to keep us from being underfoot for a bit) suggested my brother and I write letters to Santa. We could go through the wishbooks and find something to ask for.

What we actually did was lie on the floor in our pajamas, pencils in hand, and write: "Dear Santa, I want ____ and ___ and ___ and ___ for a whole page or more. We didn't even pretend to be good, first, or ask after the elves or reindeer or even Mrs. Claus! My mother was mortified at the horrible greedy children we had proven ourselves to be and no doubt sent us out to build a snow fort or something

There are still some items in life that bring me joy, but it's not really "stuff" I yearn for anymore. In fact, I find myself far more often saying 'thank you' instead of 'I want' as I look around me at the house and car and clothes and books and movies and food and music and every possible thing I could want – including health, beloved pets, and beloved people and the many, many gifts they add to my life. At church, my list of thanksgiving grows longer and longer.

At offering time, every time our tithes and offerings were gathered during worship, a colleague said a thanksgiving: "It is the gifts of our hands, feet, voices, and financial resources that enable God's work to happen through us."

In other words, it's the sharing of treasures that we have first received from God that allow God's work to happen through us.

Fellow Members of Church of the Cross,

Thank you to all who participated in the Endowment Fund survey. It was very helpful in establishing our Mission Statement, which now reads: "To provide structure for members who have the ability and desire to benefit Lutheran Church of the Cross through charitable giving that is consistent with its mission of Making Jesus Known by Sharing Our Gifts."

The mission of the Endowment Fund will be to provide a process that allows people to give a one-time or on-going gift or legacy to extend the mission of Christ's church. The application of the funds received and disbursed will be consistent with the by-laws, mission and purpose of Lutheran Church of the Cross.

As everyone knows, the financial markets have not been great these past few months and therefore our investments, via the ELCA Ministry Growth Fund, have also slumped some. When markets recover and we have meaningful interest disbursed to us, we will, in keeping with our by-laws and the congregation's survey wishes, make contributions to Community Outreach and Social Services, Support LCC Programs and Education (examples: worship and music, seminaries, colleges, students), ELCA and Synod Ministries (examples: Camp of the Cross, Campus Ministry), Congregational Development, Capital Improvements, Disaster Relief and other worthy designations.

Your church's endowment fund can accept all sorts of given assets including: cash, securities, real estate and gifts, as well as planned giving through bequests, life insurance, charitable gift annuities and IRA designation beneficiary.

One of the "painless" ways to contribute is via an IRA Charitable Rollover. If you are $72\frac{1}{2}$ or older, you can use the IRA charitable rollover to help the LCC Mission Endowment Fund continue its important work. The IRA charitable rollover allows you to meet your required minimum distribution (RMD) by directing your distribution to the Fund rather than taking it yourself. Here's how it works:

Call your IRA administrator, tell them you want to make an IRA charitable rollover gift and direct them to make the distribution to LCC Mission Endowment Fund (contact Art Wheeler for more direction). For the IRA charitable rollover to work for you, it is important that you do not take the distribution directly. The IRA administrator needs to make the distribution directly to the fund.

North Dakota allows a Tax Credit for individuals, businesses, trusts, and estates wherein they can take advantage of a 40% state tax credit for contributions of over \$5,000 to a true endowment like LCC's Mission Endowment Fund.

Please remember, Endowment Fund contributions do not go toward the church's operational budget, which still needs your continual support in order to "keep the lights on"!

Altar Focus for December Carrie Kids will be the Altar Focus for the month of December. A Christmas tree is set up in the narthex with jean ornaments listing the sizes of K–6th grade boys. Jeans are the primary focus with other items such as socks and underwear are needed. Carrie Kids is a local organization working with 150 -200 children and adolescents weekly who are homeless or at risk with a variety of programs, events, groups to reach them.

Our second Altar Focus for December is Good Gifts, which is a program of our denomination, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. We have catalogs available on the table by the fountain in the narthex, and ornaments on the small tree and a table in the narthex as well. Paul has a wonderful family and loves to travel and gather with them for destination vacations. He is also very proud of his grandchildren – some of whom are LCCers, too.
