Weeds. I've been thinking about them. Not because I'm a master gardener – ha! - but because of the extravagant growth of things in this (thankfully) non-drought year. I have several different walking routes, and I enjoy seeing the changes in the plants around me as the summer goes on. (You can also do this while driving, or even by looking out your window!) What struck me yesterday is how the weeds were flourishing.

There were some I don't remember seeing before, vining around a wire fence, with blooms like the flowers of a Japanese tree lilac, only not in tree form. There were thistles (I'm not a thistle fan), some going to seed – how I wish there was a way to keep those downy seeds from becoming billions more thistles! – but those in bloom were like an absolute flood of bright purple. And my favorites were the cheerful, clean white bells of the creeping jenny. Now I realize these are the bane of lawn and garden purists, but I remember loving them even in the ditches and along the curbs as a kid. And yesterday, twined around and through a chain link fence, they weren't impeding its work in any way – but they sure were pretty.

Also yesterday, on my walk, I realized a group of artists had been at work, because every 20 yards or so I found a brightly colored rock. Some of them carried encouraging messages: Be kind. You are loved. Dream big. Be different. Love. Be happy. And some of them, I suspect the artist may not have been old enough to write messages on them yet, and so wanted me to just enjoy the bright colors and designs of their artistry.

I truly enjoy the sights as I walk, the occasional encounters with someone I know, the songs of the birds, small surprises and once in awhile, the opportunity to talk with a friend or two, which makes miles fly by. I go to move my body a bit. It's "supposed to be good for you." It helps me think through things. It's a good time to pray. All that is true and good.

This world is full of worries, isn't it. They're like weeds. I find in my sermon notes that at least for the last 31 years, it has always been so. Walking is a way to lighten the darkness, when worry or anxiety or depression threaten to become overwhelming. Talking to a friend and talking to God are good ways, too.

I realized those cheerful little rocks made a lovely difference in my day. I didn't even need to pick one up and take it with me because I paused to admire each one of them, and I remembered them.

When the weeds of worry make you anxious that things aren't going as they should, as you intended, that this isn't the way it's supposed to be: trust God, who cares for you with the deepest love. And listen to the small surprise messages among the weeds: Be kind. You are loved. Dream big. Be different. Love. Be happy.

In fact, share those small messages with others. It makes a difference. You are loved! In Christ,

2022 ELCA Churchwide Assembly meets under the theme "Embody the Word"

Members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) will gather for the 2022 ELCA Churchwide Assembly Aug. 8-12 at the Greater Columbus Convention Center in Columbus, Ohio. Meeting under the theme "Embody the Word," the assembly will participate in plenary discussions to make decisions about the work of this church. They will also spend time in worship and Bible study.

The triennial gathering — the highest legislative body of the denomination — will be composed of more than 900 voting members serving on behalf of the 3.3 million members of the ELCA. The ELCA's 65 synods elect voting members to serve at churchwide assemblies.

ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth A. Eaton will open the assembly on Tuesday, Aug. 9, with a land acknowledgment noting that the gathering is taking place on the original and ancestral homelands of the Shawnee, Miami and Kaskaskia peoples. Tribal leaders from the Miami Nation will bring welcome to the assembly.

The assembly will then commemorate the 35th anniversary of the ELCA, which was formed when the ELCA constitution was adopted during the opening session of the Constituting Convention in Columbus on April 30, 1987. The church was formed from a merger of the American Lutheran Church, the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches, and the Lutheran Church in America.

The day will include a nonlegislative session to offer a public apology to Iglesia Luterana Santa María Peregrina and a public commitment to anti-racism. This is in response to recent events in this church that have caused harm to people, communities, and the whole body of Christ.

In other key assembly action, voting members will:

- · Elect a vice president. The position of vice president is the highest a layperson can hold in the ELCA. Carlos Peña is serving as interim vice president following the death of Bill Horne last August. Horne was elected vice president by the 2016 Churchwide Assembly.
 - · Approve budget proposals for the 2023, 2024 and 2025 fiscal years.
 - · Vote on amendments to the Constitutions, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the ELCA.

Voting members will also receive:

- A report from the presiding bishop and officers of the ELCA.
 - The first public in-person announcement of "A Declaration of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America to American Indian and Alaska Native People" and an update on the work of the Repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery Task Force. The declaration is a direct result of the social policy resolution adopted by the 2016 Churchwide Assembly.
 - · A presentation by Fawn Sharp, president of the National Congress of American Indians.
- · Proposals (known as memorials) from the ELCA's 65 synods that address social justice issues and matters relating to the structure of the ELCA, including greenhouse gas reduction; gun violence; LGBTQIA+ welcome; pastoral counseling as a result of changes to Roe v. Wade; the land back movement; ELCA governance restructure; specialized ministries and on leave from call status; and review and revision of the ELCA social statement Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust, adopted by the 2009 Churchwide Assembly.

Block Party with the neighbors!




