From Pastor Lisa

Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? Isaiah 43:18-19

Spring is in the air, finally. Hallelujah! It is a time of change: the seasons are changing, new life is springing forth. Graduations are happening and graduates are about to do new things. People move to new jobs, new places, new beginnings. Deacon Janie has moved on and LCC is in a time of transition, also.

Change is something that continually happens. Sometimes we don't like it, because we've maybe just gotten to a place where everything is clicking, everything is going well. And then change happens - though hopefully not another pandemic anytime soon! - and we are suddenly "doing a new thing."

In Isaiah 43, God is promising Israel that just as he has delivered them in the past, he will deliver them from every danger in the future. Change will happen – when we like the status quo and don't want it to come, and when we welcome it. Change is not necessarily a bad thing; it can be a good thing! And the very best way to whirl along with it is to remember God's promise here and in so many places in the Bible: God is with us, no matter what.

I thought you would appreciate an update on where we are in finding a new Director of Discipleship (which is what Deacon Janie's position is called). The LCC Council has decided that, to start with, they would like to pursue a rostered minister: a deacon or a pastor, rather than also putting the job description out there to universities and Job Service. That means we are entering the call process, which is somewhat different than simple hiring.

Council is in the process of appointing a Call Committee, which, according to our constitution, will have six members. Because the person who fills this position will be working with youth, we will have a high school age member on the committee. The others will be chosen to balance gender, age, representation of activities in the church, etc. Thanks to those of you who have indicated a willingness to serve. If you haven't let us know, please do that, promptly. Contact me or president Mike Humann. We are also developing a Ministry Site Profile, describing the congregation and our city and area, which is then shared with candidates. The job description is just about finalized. Once the paperwork is finished, it will be submitted and hopefully there are candidates that our call committee will be able to consider and interview.

This process can take a while, often a year, sometimes even more. Please pray for the call committee (whose names will be made available to you once they are appointed) and the council, as they navigate the call process. If you would like to help with youth activities once in a while, or join the teaching team for church school next year, we welcome your involvement – a little or a lot, it's up to you. Please let me know or speak to someone on the education team: Janet Bassingthwaite, Tom Harris, Kathryn Spilman, and Sarah Dahl.

If you know or come to know of a pastor or deacon who might be a fit for us, you can pass the name to me or directly to Pr. Brad Dokken in the synod office: 701-223-5312. And if you have questions, by all means, do ask the council president or me. We will do our best to keep you informed along the way!

Hello LCC Members,

The first quarter of this year has indicated that total income was substantially less than what the 2023 Adopted Budget called for. This year's budget is less than last year. Income was nearly \$33,000 less than anticipated. This fact has not caused any emergencies for our Church. But it has caused Council to use this means to remind our membership of the need for continual contributions.

So, the Council has decided to send Giving Statements for the period Jan. 1 to April 16 to help members keep up to date on needed regular Church contributions. How often the Council will decide to provide members with the individual reviews may depend on contribution history over the next 90 days.

Historically, the three summer months are times when members are on vacation, traveling, or otherwise engaged and contributions lag. There are many ways to maintain a level of giving to the Church. Sunday and Wednesday service contributions remain the most popular. The Vanco electronic giving capability on the Church's website is an easy way to contribute. Anyone having a problem using electronic means may contact either one of us. But the main objective is that contributions will continue, or increase, during the next three months. Our members who listen to services via streaming should also be continuous contributors to the Church.

The Council has been very diligent in keeping expenses within budget. At the present time, expenses are about \$41,800 less than the adopted budget projected. There will also be an expense saving of approximately \$4.400 each month the staff position is vacant. The General Operating Fund for the Church has kept fairly steady due to 2021 and 2022 General Fund carryovers. But if the Adopted Budget is not met, the Fund carryovers will decrease during this year.

A recent roof leak caused a failure in the fire detection system near the dishwashing room. Repairs to make the system functional as required by the fire code will cost about \$5,900. There are 84 bulbs and 36 flood lights in the Sanctuary. They are all incandescent bulbs. Replacements are not available. Eventually all the sanctuary light bulbs will have to be replaced with LED's and new upgrades to the lighting panel. We do not have an estimated cost for the replacement yet.

So, please review your most recent Giving Statement. If your contributions have only been occasional, or not on a regular basis, please consider using some type of regular schedule for your personal contribution to the Church's work. If the Adopted Budget can be met, more funds can be used for community projects and new programs within "our Church."

Legacy: Living and Leaving a Life with Meaning

One of the universal desires we all have is that our life should be lived with meaning and purpose. We want to live in such a way that makes a positive impact on the world around us and on the lives of those we love. And, with some careful planning, we hope to leave something behind when we die – something to be remembered by, something that enables our life's work to live on long after we're gone. In life, and in death, we want our imprint on the world to be a reflection of our values. That is the very definition of a Legacy.

So, what will your legacy be? What story will your life tell? Have you given any thought to it, or will you simply leave your legacy to chance? Unfortunately, most of us spend more time planning our next vacation than we do planning (and/or reviewing) our legacy.

What plans do you have in place? Do your plans include more than just a will? When did you last review your plans? Have you shared your plans with those around you who are important to you (your loved ones, the causes and institutions you support)?

That last step is perhaps the most important. Often even good, solid, legal and financial plans still fail to accomplish a person's legacy goals. Your legacy is more than just some numbers on a financial ledger or a name on the deed to a bit of land. Your legacy should be a story, and the story should tell what you are most proud of and what gave your life its deepest meaning.

Years ago, I read an article by a person who recounted his experience at the reading of the last will and testament of his recently deceased grandmother. What he expected was a typical, bland, lifeless narration that goes something like this: "I (insert the deceased person's name), being of sound mind and body do hereby bequeath the following..." which is then followed by a laundry list of cash and other assets and who they go to.

But what he heard instead was a beautiful, extremely personal and touching narration by his grand-mother about her faith. She wrote about how her faith had sustained her in good times and bad. She framed her whole life, her experiences and her possessions, as purposeful and faithful. Clearly, she wanted to pass along not just possessions, but the faith that had shaped her whole life. And in so doing, she shaped how her heirs remembered her and how they received whatever possessions she left to them.

Inherited wealth and possessions may quickly fade, but an inherited faith that gives life purpose and meaning is a gift that will last a lifetime... or more! *Keith Pearson is the ELCA Foundation's Regional Gift Planner and LCC's legacy giving advisor. Pre-Assembly activities will begin on Friday, June 2, 2023, and Synod Assembly opens with worship on Saturday morning and concludes with worship in the early afternoon on Sunday, June 4, 2023. Each congregation appoints voting members to the Synod Assembly based on baptized membership. We are allowed three, plus our pastor. 
Clean Up Night May 10!



Come Celebrate a Double Church Birthday!

The Evangelical Lutheran Churches in Cameroon and Central African Republic are 100 years old this year, and we are throwing a double birthday party for them. On July 7-9, 2023, Lutherans from the United States and Canada will be gathering in the Twin Cities to mark the event, and we'd like you to be there.

It was March 8, 1923, actually, when they landed in Douala, Cameroon — Norwegian-Americans with names like Adolphus Gunderson from Stoughton, Wisconsin, his bride Marie Gunderson from Bode, Iowa, and Anne Olsen and Olette Berntsen, Lutheran deaconesses from Brooklyn. Troubled by the lack of Christian witness across a wide band of African geography known as "the Sudan," they set out to share their faith with those who had not yet heard. After 26 days of walking bush trails and exploring places to begin their work, they settled down in a town called Mboula. Soon dozens, then hundreds, then thousands of African believers joined them, and our Lutheran World Federation companion churches in Cameroon and Central African Republic are the result.

And it all began 100 years this year. How often do you get to celebrate an event like that? This summer is the time.

We'll be arriving in the Twin Cities Friday, July 7th, and staying in the Hilton Garden Inn in Minneapolis, just across the street from Central Lutheran Church. Saturday morning we'll be bused to Luther Seminary for A Day of Song and Seminar. The five North American companion synods have invited Cameroonian church president Baïguele Jean, Central African church president Ngoe Joseph, and two women's leaders, Sodea Joëlle Kyria and Francine Grace Yaimann, to be present. You will hear them talk about current opportunities and challenges in their home churches. You will get to ponder how they do evangelical outreach so effectively in their context and wonder how we might do it better in ours. You will have a chance to be part of a missionary supper that evening before being bussed back to the Hilton. Sunday morning festal services at Central Lutheran will include ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton as preacher. And we will conclude our weekend over coffee and fellowship at Central before saying our farewells.

It's the event of a century. Again, we'd like you to be there. Two online registration sites are available: https://sdsynod.org/sudanmissioncentennial for general registration, and https://sdsynod.org/glocalyouth2023 for a unique program for youth. Check them out. And welcome!
