From Pastor Lisa

I've been struggling the last couple of weeks, partly coming out of the brain fog of Covid, and partly overwhelmed by the world. In the midst of this, I was struck by this essay by Sarah Bessey and wanted to share it with you:

I simply get to work on ordinary things.

This is all I know to do when I don't know what to do.

We go for a walk in the Saturday morning's cold. We pay attention to the snow dusting the tops of the mountains to the north and to the east of us: look at that, I say to the tinies in their toques, isn't it beautiful? We pass a bit of time with neighbours as we run into them. We can see our breath so we turn for home sooner than we planned. We draw pictures at the kitchen table after a lunch of grilled cheese and tomato soup.

I make a plan for the week's meals and then a list for the grocery store, carefully grouping each item by section. I load up the tinies and we go to the store, pushing the cart up and down aisles, piling in food for the week ahead. One tiny in the cart's little seat, one on my back, another holding to the side of the cart, we negotiate in the aisles over bags of chips and cereal boxes. Older women stop me to say, "you sure have your hands full," with a smile. I always smile back and nod, "yep, three in four years," I say. We drive home and unload the groceries. I slice their green grapes in half and give them each a plastic bowl. They plop their little bums on the floor to eat their snack.

Then, the baby back on my back in the baby carrier as usual, I get out the vacuum, and I drag it over the floor, sucking up every crumb and oops, a few stray Lego pieces. The tinies go outside to putter in the yard with their dad, digging in the dirt and pulling up logs and filling old sand buckets with worms. I move around our house, picking things up and putting them back where they belong: socks, books, more Lego pieces, permission slips, empty cups, inside-out shirts, toys, shoes, soothers.

One after another, everything is restored to its place and order slowly returns to this ordinary house. The sun is sinking earlier and earlier with each passing day: today, I turn the lamps on at 4 o'clock. I get supper started and then when they come back inside, I huff at everyone about tracking in all that yard dirt on my clean floors. The sky is pitch dark by the time we sit down to eat as a family, just a regular old meal of burgers and oven french fries.

After supper and clean-up, I dance the baby around the kitchen while the kids are dancing in the living room. We're spinning to something happy by Taylor Swift and yet, I'm wiping away hot tears while they twirl.

Happy children, happy children, God please, everyone should be happy children dancing in safe kitchens.

We measure them up against the wall, they're growing by leaps and bounds, I'll never be able to keep them in jeans. There is a bin of broken crayons in the basement and there are clean sheets on the beds. Then everyone has been scrubbed and lotioned and combed, now smelling lovely and getting sleepy. Warm babies in a warm home. I've clipped thirty tiny fingernails plus thirty tiny toenails now hiding in footie jammies. Hockey Night in Canada is on mute and I've got the baby down for her first shift of sleep, so the tinies get out their battered board books. They turn pages by the lamplight of their own little routines and the glow of the hockey game on tv.

I don't know what to pray and I don't really know what to do.

The world seems like it's crashing around us, from all four corners of the world and right next door, too. We are afraid and we don't know what to do so we are turning the news on and off, scrolling constantly, pacing our minds. We are pontificating on social media and we are writing letters or emails. We are showing up for protests and demonstrations and vigils. We are getting mad at each other for all the ways we're all doing it wrong. Donating money, writing letters, feeling futile.

I imagine I'm not alone in feeling pretty powerless, angry, sad, and full of longing for peace right now. As Rabbi Danya Ruttenberg said, nobody's children should be killed, nobody's. But we can keep doing the ordinary work. So let's do that. So let's keep advocating wherever we can for an end to violence, humanitarian aid and relief. Let's keep praying for peace – even if it's only groaning - the Spirit knows. May peace be our journey.

November 2023

Autumn has arrived, and your church council thought that this would be a good time to share a glimpse of how LCC finances stand now, as we head into budgeting for next year. Year to date, our contributions are about 79% of the budget the congregation adopted. Of course, not having the second pastoral staff person since Deacon Janie left has helped our income/expense ratio somewhat, but naturally we hope to find the right person soon. Offerings are welcome and needed! They make possible the ministry we do, in our building and far beyond.

The cash flow of the past eleven weeks has caused some concern. Over these weeks, our contributions have averaged only 59.3% of our expenses.

We are lucky in that Church of the Cross has often been blessed to receive charitable gifts and Required Minimum Distributions (RMD's) during the last six weeks of the fiscal year. Those have helped dramatically for the church to end the year with a good general fund operating balance. It also helped our Church to make semi-annual contributions to the Western North Dakota Synod, Camp of the Cross, Heart River Lutheran Church, and Missouri Slope Care Center, among others; our partners in ministry.

Quite a few of our members have contributed of their finances, and the church is grateful. The church appreciates so very much all that has been contributed and "thanks you" very much. Many of our members are also generous with their time and talents, and that helps make LCC the giving, growing place we are. As you contemplate your financial offerings, year end charitable gifts, RMD's, and directing your Thrivent Choice dollars, we are glad that you hold LCC as valuable in your considerations. Together, LCC can begin 2024 with an adequate general fund operating balance.

The Lord has bestowed many blessings to us all. The council hopes, with everyone's help, that we can continue to serve our members, the community, and other partners in ministry. Thank you!

Please join us for a free Western North Dakota Synod event this November 4th. We will gather to take part in a Bible study, learn about mental health, take part in a panel discussion about ministry opportunities, and to do God's work together! This event will be held at Oak Valley Lutheran Church, 400 Main Street North in Velva, ND.

A Bible study will be lead by Dr. Michael Chan, Executive Director for Faith & Learning at Concordia College in Moorhead, MN. Dr. Chan joined the Concordia College community in June of 2022. Prior to that, he was Associate Professor of Old Testament at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN. He joined Luther Seminary after completing his Ph. D. at Emory University and a year of research and teaching at the University of Helsinki. He is a graduate of Luther Seminary (M.A. in Biblical Theology) and Pacific Lutheran University (B.A. in Elementary Education). As the Executive Director for Faith and Learning, Dr. Chan directs the Lorentzsen Center for Faith and Work and the Dovre Center for Faith and Learning, guides Concordia's interfaith relationships, and oversees the work of Campus Ministry. Dr. Chan was our guest speaker at the 2023 Synod Assembly.

Also joining us is Jason Hills, retired USAF and Certified Suicide Intervention Counselor. He comes highly recommended by Pastor Emily Nesdahl, from Christ Lutheran in Minot. Jason is a Veteran and has worked with both Veterans and active duty military who offers services and also educates civilians. He is certified in three different areas: depression, domestic violence, and music therapy. He is a self-proclaimed Christian and includes faith as a critical part of getting well.

Pastor Mark Narum, from Trinity Lutheran Church in Bismarck, will moderate a panel of ordained and lay leaders who will give insight into various areas of ministry in the synod. Some of the topics will include lay preaching, education available to those who have an interest in ministry, and what the future might look like in our synod.

Altar Focus: Teddy bears and Foster Hope

Our newest altar focus is "Foster Hope," which provides kids in foster care with clothes, suitcases, stuffed animals, and more. Many times, when a child is placed in foster care, they arrive with their belongings in a garbage bag, other times they have no belongings with them. This program aims to combat that and give these children something permanent they can take with them.

Needs: (from the founder, Tracey Preuss, an RN at Sanford) we could use kids clothes, books, blankets, and suitcases. All gently loved.

We put clothes in suitcases with a comfort item like books, a blanket and possibly a stuffed animal so kids will have clothes when they enter placement.

We also make birthday cake kits for families to make birthday cakes. Instead of oil and butter, they use sprite.

We could use:

- 1) Disposable pans
- 2) cake mixes
- 3) candles
- 4) balloons
- 5) birthday cards
- 6) sprite
- 7) frosting
- 8) sprinkles

Donations of backpacks are also welcome. This past august we handed out 345 backpacks with school supplies before school started!

Teddy Bears, Teddy Bears, Teddy Bears. Let's fill up the sanctuary with worshipping Teddy Bears who after a blessing will be ready to comfort a child hopefully through some tough moments of crisis. This Altar Focus is the special project we all love, spearheaded by Shiela Mugaas in memory of her cousin. At the end of November the bears will be distributed to first responders.

Inviting Volunteers Western North Dakota Synod Paul N. Marsh, CFRE, GSB Fundraising



For more than a decade, church clients have repeated the same challenge to me: volunteers are harder to recruit than ever before.

Volunteers are the backbone of any successful congregational ministry. What used to be called the 80/20 Rule (80% of the work is done by 20% of the people) is now 90/10 or worse. So how do you reverse this trend in your church?

We have talked in this space about the process to get a financial gift: we inform about what we are raising money for specifically, we inspire by answering the question why this project is so important, we invite a specific gift or gift commitment, and we thank the donor. The process for recruiting a volunteer is the same!





Prospective volunteers want to serve, but most are concerned about signing on for an endless term of service, being drawn into unrelated tasks for which they have no interest or ability, and being unsupported. When you address these concerns up front, you will have a far greater chance of success in recruitment.

We suggest preparing a one-pager that describes three to five specific tasks of the role, the specific term of service (usually one year except for council members), and email and phone numbers for leaders who will respond to questions or problems which may arise. Also nice to have are some quotes from those who have served in that role in the past, describing how meaningful the role was to them.



Finally, plan an exhaustive annual volunteer orientation and training program.

When you begin implementing this plan for recruitment, you will see an increase in dedicated volunteers.



Your LCC Mission Endowment Fund

The LCC Mission Endowment Fund was established as a permanent endowment fund, the purpose of which is to enhance the outreach and mission of LCC and to assist in specific capital or special expenses. Endowment funds are partnerships between donors and the church. Partnerships based on the idea of mutual stewardship. Endowment funds provide additional support for ministries and special projects beyond the yearly operating budget, as well as supporting the future generations of LCC.

Each year, the Endowment Committee will transfer a portion of the Endowment Fund's annual earnings, as dictated by its By Laws, to identified ministries for their use.

Gifts, to the Endowment Fund, made through your contributions, wills, and estate planning process extend financial support to the Endowment Fund. If possible, please consider discussing your gifts, confidentially, with a committee member in advance so we may work with you and ensure your intentions are honored.

Your financial gifts to the Endowment Fund are placed in a professionally managed portfolio (the ELCA Ministry Growth Fund). There is no minimum amount for a gift. All gifts from members and friends of LCC support and benefit the ministry and mission of LCC. LCC and its Endowment Fund are a nonprofit 501(c) (3) organization.

One of the "painless" ways to contribute is via an IRA Charitable Rollover. If you are $72\frac{1}{2}$ or older, you can use the IRA charitable rollover to help the LCC Mission Endowment Fund continue its important work. The IRA charitable rollover allows you to meet your required minimum distribution (RMD) by directing your distribution to the Fund rather than taking it yourself.

North Dakota allows a Tax Credit for individuals, businesses, trusts, and estates wherein they can take advantage of a 40% state tax credit for contributions of over \$5,000 to a true endowment like LCC's Mission Endowment Fund.

We invite you to explore the charitable giving opportunities available to you. Gifts, both cash and property, may be made as outright gifts or bequests, or by naming LCC as a beneficiary of a 401(k) or IRA, a life insurance policy, or a charitable trust.

Thank you for your faithfulness! Know that your generosity empowers LCC to "Make Jesus Known By Sharing Our Gifts."
