The Table / The Lesson

After the death of my husband I began sorting out certain belongings and inquiring if anyone in the family could use them. They chose a few items and then I started the task of finding anyone in need that would appreciate them. The remainder was donated to charitable thrift shops. It was difficult for the family to see this. I decided to share my story in the hope that it would help alleviate some of their sadness.

Our sons had graduated from the highchair and we desperately needed a dining room table. Without two nickels to rub together I gathered the courage to ask papa if I could have the drop leaf pine table that stood on a cold back porch. It was laden with boxes of tools and "junk". I had never asked anything from him but my request was denied. His answer may have been based on the years that he lived during The Great Depression or otherwise it was meant to teach me a lesson. He missed my smile that day.

A few weeks went by and I was able to adopt a rickety table at a garage sale. The adoption fee was \$1.00. I proudly took it home and gave it a thorough cleaning. Fork marks were noted in the soft pine along with what appeared to be teething marks on the edges. The dining room floor was uneven and so were the legs. A home remedy solved that — folded matchbooks or pieces of cardboard.

Most days I attempted to disguise that table's imperfections with a colorful cloth but that did not last long. The boys much preferred watercolor paint and playdough for decoration. The table had been given a new lease on life and had a sense of belonging, warmth and closeness. It had become a table of love and a life connection.

The magic of little hands racing their cars across the top made it tickle. The table listened in loving silence to the laughter of birthday celebrations and ignored the smeared frosting. The boys clamoring on top to sit and decorate cookies made it creak with joy and when one of the boys would bump his head into the corner of the table it groaned with sadness. Puzzle pieces, Go Fish and Hangman were part of the daily routine and it laughed along with all the giggles, feeling love and being needed.

Papa would share in all the family celebrations and family dinners but was oblivious about the table and never remarked about its tottering condition. It was to reside there for a number of years until we saved up enough to replace it.—Replace it physically but always remembering every dent, scratch or chip, for it had a story to tell.

I carried that pine table from papa's back porch quite a while after his funeral but I no longer needed it and it was placed in storage.

The lesson here is: give while you can, what you can and watch the smiles that come back to you.

Speaking of Generosity – Opportunities for Giving

At worship you often hear me thank you for your generosity. We are grateful! Our many ministries here at LCC and those we support in the community and wider world could not do it without you! Here are some ways you can give at and through LCC. Choose which fits your lifestyle best!

Offering envelopes: These are found on the oak cabinet in the narthex, far right side (or ask treasurers Art Wheeler or Sarah Dahl, if there are none). You can put cash or checks in these and as long as your name is on it (or treasurers are aware of your envelope number), your offering will be recorded for you.

Online: we use Vanco for our other forms of giving. All the options are linked, so you can give through any of the following ways, and they will all be recorded for you. The treasurers send statements a couple of times per year.

Website: you can easily set up an online giving account on our website – then you don't have to do it each time you go online. You can also set recurring gifts if you like, and choose various funds to give to, through the website.

Text: You can also give by text! I know - the world these days! Many people no

longer carry cash – but almost everyone carries their smart phone. So, you can use the Vanco Mobile app, OR you can simply send a text to our dedicated number: 701-969-7030. Just put a number in the message – 20 if you'd like to give \$20, etc. It will prompt you to sign in or set up a Vanco account (which would have your credit, debit or checking account number, which is where the money would come from in any of these cases – all safely encrypted, of course. This is the same account used for the other methods.). You can test this by giving a \$1 donation, say, and if you find it simple – maybe this will be your choice for giving!

Vanco Mobile App: you can download the Vanco Mobile app on your phone. This will link to the same account, if you've set one up on the website, or you can give only through the app if you like. Just make sure to choose OUR Lutheran Church of the Cross, as there are others in other cities/states!

Summer Altar Focus: Items for LWR Baby Care Kits & School Care Kits

Baby kits will contain:

TWO lightweight cotton t-shirts (no Onesies ®)

TWO long- or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet)

TWO receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, between 36" and 52" square

FOUR cloth diapers, flat fold preferred

ONE jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby cap

TWO pairs of socks

ONE hand towel, dark color recommended

TWO or three bath-size bars of gentle soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping; no mini or hotel size bars

TWO diaper pins or large safety pins

School Care Kits contain:

- 4 -70 sheet notebooks
- 5 unsharpened #2 pencils w/erasers
- 1 16 or 24 crayons
- 5 black or blue ballpoint pens
- 1 pencil sharpener
- 1 2 ¹/₂" eraser
- 1 12 inch ruler
- 1 blunt scissors
